Inventors, Scientists & Architects

Most Important

Gertrude Bell	1868-1926	British writer, traveller, political analyst, administrator in Arabia, and an archaeologist who mapped and identified Anatolian and Mesopotamian ruins. She was appointed Commander of the Order of the British Empire in 1917.
Maria Curie	1867-1934	Physicist and chemist of Polish upbringing and, subsequently, French citizenship. She was a pioneer in the field of radioactivity, the first person honored with two Nobel Prizes, and the first female professor at the University of Paris.
Sarah E Goode	1850's-1905?	Born a slave in 1850, she was the first African American woman to apply for and receive a patent, for her folding cabinet beddesk.
Josephine Garis Cochran	1839-1913	1889 of Shelbyville, Illinois, invents the first working automatic dishwasher. Her invention was first shown at the 1893 World's Fair in Chicago, Illinois, and eventually went on to become associated with the KitchenAid company.
Mary Anderson	1866-1953	Real estate developer, rancher, viticulturist and inventor of the windshield wiper blade. In November 1903 Anderson was granted her first patent for an automatic car window cleaning device controlled inside the car, called the windshield wiper. Patented in 1905, windshield wipers became standard equipment on cars a decade later.
Madam C.J. Walker	1867-1919	Developed and marketed a hugely successful line of beauty and hair products for black women, under the company she founded Madam C.J. Walker Manufacturing Company. The Guinness Book of Records cites Walker as the first female who became a millionaire by her own achievements.
Julia Morgan	1872-1957	The architect of over 700 buildings in California, she is best known for her work on Hearst Castle in San Simeon, California. Throughout her long career, she designed multiple buildings for institutions serving women and girls.

Nettie Maria Stevens	1861-1912	Early American geneticist. She and Edmund Beecher Wilson were the first researchers to describe the chromosomal basis of sex.	
Lillian Moller Gilbreth	1878-1972	Inventor, author, industrial engineer, industrial psychologist, and mother of twelve children. A pioneer in ergonomics, Gilbreth patented many kitchen appliances including an electric food mixer, shelves inside refrigerator doors, and the famous trash can with a foot-pedal lid-opener. Lillian Gilbreth is best known for her work to help workers in industry with her classic Time & Motion Studies, which supported work simplification and industrial efficiency.	
Marie Tucek		In 1893, New Yorker Marie Tucek was granted US patent 494397 for a "breast supporter", described as a modification of the corset, and consisted of a plate made of metal, cardboard, or other stiff material, covered with silk, canvas, or other cloth. Vogue magazine first used the term "brassiere" in 1907, and the invention would shortly remake women's fashion.

Sarah Bernhardt	1844-1923	Legendary French stage actress, and has been referred to as "the most famous actress in the history of the world". Bernhardt made her fame on the stages of Europe in the 1870s, and was soon in demand in Europe and the Americas. She developed a reputation as a serious dramatic actress, earning the nickname "The Divine Sarah."	
Lillian Russell	1860-1922	American actress and singer. She became one of the most famous actresses and singers of the late 19th century and early 20th century	Cast?
Mata Hari	1886-1917	A Dutch-Frisian exotic dancer and courtesan who was executed by firing squad for espionage during World War I.	
Annie Oakley	1860-1926	American sharpshooter and exhibition shooter. Oakley's amazing talent and rise to fame led to a starring role in Buffalo Bill's Wild West show, which propelled her to become the first American female superstar. Using a .22 caliber rifle at 90 feet, Oakley reputedly could split a playing card edge-on and put five or six more holes in it before it touched the ground.	
Lillie Hitchcock Coit	1842-1929	Volunteer firefighter and the benefactor for the construction of the Coit Tower	
Lillie Langtry	1853-1929	Highly successful British actress born on the island of Jersey. A renowned beauty, she was nicknamed the "Jersey Lily" and had a number of prominent lovers, including the future King Edward VII.	
Luisa Tetrazzini	1871-1940	An Italian coloratura soprano of great international fame, Tetrazzini's voice was remarkable for its phenomenal flexibility, thrust and thrilling tone. She enjoyed a highly successful operatic and concert career in Europe and America from the 1890s through to the 1920s.

Maude Adams	1872-1953	American stage actress, who achieved her greatest success as Peter Pan which opened in 1905 Adams' personality appealed to a large audience and helped her become the most successful and highest-paid performer of her day, with a yearly income of more than one million dollars during her peak.
Mae West	1893-1980	American actress, playwright, screenwriter, and sex symbol. (Age 12ish in vaudeville in 1905)
Ethel Barrymore	1879-1959	Highly regarded stage actress in New York City and a major Broadway performer. Many today consider her to be the greatest actress of her generation.
Fanny Brice	1891-1951	Popular and influential American comedienne, singer, theatre and film actress, dropped out of school to work in a burlesque revue at 17.
Sophie Tucker	1884-1966	Singer and comedian, one of the most popular entertainers in America during the first two-thirds of the 20th century.
Polaire	1874-1939	Music Hall Singer with impossibly tiny waist
Little Egypt (Farida Mazar Spyropoulos)	c. 1871-?	aka Fatima, she appeared at the "Street in Cairo" exhibition at the World's Columbian Exposition, in Chicago in 1893. Spyropoulos was the first to demonstrate this type of dancing in the US, which came to be referred to as the "Hoochee-Coochee". At that time the word "bellydance" had not yet entered the American vocabulary.

Alice Roosevelt	1884-1980	The only child of Roosevelt and his first wife, Alice Hathaway Lee.
Helen Pardee		First lady of California
Carrie Nation	1846-1911	Ardent temperance advocate, almost six feet tall. a member of the temperance movement, particularly noted for promoting her viewpoint through vandalism. On many occasions, Nation would enter an alcohol-serving establishment and attack the bar with a hatchet. Nation was a large woman nearly 6 feet (tall and weighing 175 pounds. She described herself as "a bulldog running along at the feet of Jesus, barking at what He doesn't like", and claimed a divine ordination to promote temperance by smashing up bars.
Susan B Anthony	1820-1906	Prominent American civil rights leader who played a pivotal role in the 19th century women's rights movement to introduce women's suffrage into the United States. She traveled the United States and Europe, and gave 75 to 100 speeches every year on women's rights for 45 years.

Harriet Tubman	1822-1913	Born a slave, abolitionist, conductor on the Underground Railroad, led over 300 slaves to freedom
Clara Barton	1821-1912	A nurse during the Civil War, she founded American Red Cross

Sarah Winchester	1839-1922	Winchester Rifle widow, who believed should construction ever stop on her house, she would die. n 1903, Theodore Roosevelt, who was then president, passed through San Jose and called at the Winchester Mansion. He was turned away with the message that "the house was not open to strangers." According to servants' tales, the only guests that Sarah entertained were spectral ones.
Nellie Bly	1864-1922	Journalist, businesswoman, went around the world in "seventy-two days, six hours, eleven minutes and fourteen seconds"
Margaret (Molly) Brown	1867-1932	American socialite, philanthropist, and activist who became famous in the 1912 sinking of the RMS Titanic, after getting lifeboat 6 to return to look for survivors and as leader of the women survivors. She became known after her death as The Unsinkable Molly Brown, although she was not called Molly during her life. Her friends called her Maggie.
Evelyn Nesbit	1884-1967	Model, chorus girl, iconic "Gibson Girl" (before the murder scandal of 1906)

Annie Edson Taylor	1838-1921	Became the first person to survive a trip over Niagara Falls in a barrel on 24 October 1901.
Josephine Wright Chapman	1867-?	The only female architect of a Pan-American Exposition building

Beatrix Potter	1866-1943	English author, illustrator, mycologist and conservationist who was best known for her many best-selling children's books that featured animal characters, such as Peter Rabbit.
Gertrude Atherton	1857-1948	San Francisco writer, protégée of Ambrose Bierce, eventually writing 60 books and numerous articles and short stories. Atherton's first signed novel, What Dreams May Come, was published in 1888 under the pseudonym Frank Lin.
Bertha von Suttner	1843-1914	Austrian novelist, radical (organizational) pacifist, and the first woman to be a Nobel Peace Prize laureate.
Edith Wharton	1862-1937	figures, including Henry James and Theodore Roosevelt. The Age of Innocence (1920) won the 1921 Pulitzer Prize for literature, making her the first woman to win the award.
Laura Ingalls Wilder	1867-1957	American writer, author of "Little House on the Prairie" books
Helen Keller	1880-1968	Overcame blindness and deafness, graduated from Radcliffe, gave many speeches on behalf of the physically handicapped and wrote several books

Ina Coolbrith	1841-1928	Poet, writer, librarian, and a prominent and beloved figure in the San Francisco Bay Area literary community.	
Mary Hunter Austin	1868-1934	American writer of fiction and non-fiction, For 17 years she made a special study of Indian life in the Mojave Desert, and her publications set forth the intimate knowledge she thus acquired. She was a prolific novelist, poet, critic, and playwright, as well as an early feminist and defender of Native American and Spanish-American rights.	
Frances Hodgson Burnett	1849-1924	English–American playwright and author. She is best known for her children's stories, in particular 'The Secret Garden, A Little Princess, and Little Lord Fauntleroy.	
Dorothy Canfield Fisher	1879-1958	Educational reformer, social activist, and best-selling American author in the early decades of the Twentieth century; Dorothy Canfield brought the Montessori method of child rearing to the United States	
Willa Sibert Cather	1873-1947	American author who grew up in Nebraska. She is best known for her depictions of frontier life on the Great Plains in novels such as O Pioneers!, My Ántonia, and The Song of the Lark.

Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney	1875-1942	American sculptor, art patron and collector, and founder in 1931 of the Whitney Museum of American Art in New York City.	
Mary Stevenson Cassatt	1844-1926	Degas and later exhibited among the Impressionists.	
Helen Hyde	1868-1919	Japanese women and children characterizations.	
Frances Benjamin Johnston	1864-1952	one of the earliest American female photographers and photojournalists.
